22nd August - Mike's Mid-Week Run

Our run on Wednesday 22nd Aug started from Halfpenny Green Airport where, appropriately, we all lined up in the Taxi Rank opposite the Antique Centre in bright sunshine.

18 signed up for the ride. Dave Roberts brought his mighty Matchless Model X, complete with Fray Bentos Pie tin air cleaner. Bill Danks joined us with his Morgan, but did not do the run; Martin Griffiths came to see us off. It was good to welcome back Alan Bromwich on his BSA B31, he having been unable to ride since May due to a mishap.



We set off past Highgate Common to Enville village where we joined the A458 for a short way, then into the narrow, potholed Hollies Lane, passing the Enville Brewery. We went through Shatterford and on to Trimpley, where unfortunately Dave Roberts had a close encounter with an oncoming lorry which left him no room. He was squeezed between the

stone and earth bank and the lorry, the gap just too narrow for him to get through. Dave was shaken and bruised but appeared to be not injured. The Matchless suffered a bent footrest and damaged headlamp. Dave was able to continue to the coffee stop after some temporary repairs. There was a short holdup in Bewdley for traffic lights at some bridge repairs, then we rode alongside the River Severn towards Stourport. The coffee stop was at Midwest Moto where we were well received at Mark Grinnall's Indian dealership.



The upstairs cafe offered coffee and cakes and the showroom has a good display of the Indian range, all very impressive. Mark even brought out two demonstrators for us to try. John Jones took up the offer and was still out when we all left. Dave Roberts decided to return home and rest his 'bruised' leg, but not before sending Mark Grinnall out on the Matchless X so that he could sample a "proper" Vee twin, bent footrest notwithstanding. Page 2 took us up Burnthorne lane, through Heightington on to Bliss Gate, then the A456 for a short way, branching off towards Far Forest.
