## Run to the SE Davis Historic Vehicle and Plant Collection- 11th May 2024

This year's run started from Halfpenny Green Airport car park where 14 riders gathered in bright sunny weather. There was a good mix of classics and modern classics. Unfortunately the airport cafe was not open due to rebuilding work.

The run was to visit the S.E. Davis collection of historic vehicles. This is a private collection of construction and earthmoving machinery not usually open to the public. The Davis family kindly allowed us to visit on the same day as the Traction Engine Trust were attending a training day. The venue is located south of Redditch, consequently the route needed to cross several main roads while avoiding busy areas, finding good sight lines at crossings. Fortunately there were no road closures on the day.

It then re closed before the group of riders appeared. Fortunately a car was leaving just before they arrived and the gate opened, letting everyone in.
